- 1. Background:** Introduce yourself, who you are (include information about your proposed project), or the organization you represent (if applicable).

I am dryland farmer, certified water harvesting practitioner, orchardist, apiarist, trained land conservationist and steward. Throughout the years I have cultivated and cared for my family orchard at my home in Kykotsmovi, and also my family field south of Oraivi. I have always kept the habit of controlling the wind and water erosion at my family's current field. Due to my in-law recent passing I was tasked to take care of the field he cultivated for my so'oh. Throughout the past years I have done my best, with the least amount of modern resources, to continue to cultivate and steward this field east, in the Oraivi foothills.

- 2. Project Narrative:** What is your proposed project and its purpose? Why did you choose this project?

This is a watershed restoration and erosion project, primarily aimed at reducing the velocity at which rainwater is shed off the east Oraivi foothills. This will be accomplished through the construction and utilization of a variety of earthworks such as rock dams, leaky wiers, trincheras, earthen berms, zuni bowls, etc. The main purpose of the earthworks are to disperse water slowly and evenly throughout the landscape, collect nutrient rich sediments and soils in cultivation areas, and allow groundwater infiltration to support the hydration of native plants, animals, and crops around the eastern Oraivi foothills. I fell a project such as this demands all of our immediate attention and action as Hopi people. This project is at the top of my many projects I plan to complete within my life, because it is important that I keep the places I cultivate healthy and rich so that the future generations pl plants, animals and people can benefit off of my work of feed themselves and flourish.

- 3. How does your project incorporate Hopi values and the mission of the Natwani Coalition (to preserve and strengthen the agricultural traditions of the Hopi and Tewa people)?**

My project incorporates the values of land stewardship, humility, and community. From our emergence into the fourth world we promised Maasaw we would take care of his land, therefore establishing and constructing earthworks along the landscape to benefit the health of our watersheds and land in general is the fulfillment of our agreement with Maasaw. Work like this is not taken lightly, as it can be very strenuous at times. Lack of mechanized equipment not used on this work, usually do to the risk of causing more erosion, also contributes to the load. because of these facts, in my opinion, the less reliant are we are on fossil fuel burning equipment and the more we rely on ourselves and community to do the work that revitalizes the land teaches us humility.

Much of my income that I receive, comes from my work as a workshop instructor and facilities for Hopi Tutskwa Permaculture Institute. I use the income I receive to purchase my food for my crews as well as pay for any transportation and lodging for any volunteers. I will also have help from my family to provide an amenities for volunteers helping me with this project. My work with Hopi Tutskwa Permaculture Institute usually takes my week, but being a flexible job, I usually provide time to work on these projects. I consider what I do with the land as part of life itself and projects like this that I am undertaking are multi-generational projects. This is something that I will always do until I leave this earth, so my efforts will continue to persist in preserving fertile farmland for future generations.

My name is [REDACTED] I come from the Corn Clan of Tewa village. I am a mother, a wife, and a grandmother. I first learned to make piki 20 years ago from my late aunt [REDACTED]. Through her teachings I learned the importance of why we as women must learn how to make piki and how important it is to have your own tumsoki (piki house) Piki is used in all ceremonies it is a skill one must have patience to be able to accomplish. I have been teaching my daughter and granddaughter how to make piki. I have clan relatives who wish to learn and I would be more than happy to teach them if I had my own tumsoki.

2. **Project Narrative:** What is your proposed project and its purpose? Why did you choose this project?

Being a wife and mother to 1 daughter, 5 sons they are all very active in cultural doings. Building my own tumsoki has become essential when you consider the amount of time I put into making piki. I have been grateful for family that are willing to let me use their tumsoki when they were able to. Preparing for ceremonies it becomes very busy and there have been times when it was not available to use. This resulted in me having to buy piki. This saddens me as I feel I am wasting money since I am able to make my own piki and I have the corn to do so. This project would allow me to continue to teach my daughter and granddaughter how to make piki as well as how to properly care for a piki stone.

3. How does your project incorporate Hopi values and the mission of the Natwani Coalition (*to preserve and strengthen the agricultural traditions of the Hopi and Tewa people*)?

With this project I would have my own tumsoki in which I am able to share my knowledge and teachings in piki making to not only my immediate family but other Hopi/Tewa females as well. In doing so this will preserve and strengthen piki making which is a traditional food. As a woman you feel proud when you are able to provide your own piki not only to feed people but to contribute to ceremonies, weddings, baby naming's, social dances, pay backs, etc. I have always been taught to share what I know and with this project I feel this will provide more flexibility to do so.



4. Statement of Need: Describe the problem or need your project aims to address. What is the situation that is causing concern? Why is it happening?

The need is to have my own tumsoki that I will be able to use when ever I need to. Currently I use a tumsoki that belongs to my clan sisters and with so many female relatives using the stone it sometimes can be hard to get in. My work schedule doesn't help and at time I result in having to take leave from work to make piki during the week when the tumsoki is available. If I had my own it would relieve the pressure and stress of having to hurry and no worries of having to look to buy piki.

5. Project Impact: Identify measurable outcomes and impacts your project will have on the Hopi/Tewa Community. Provide measurable results.

With this project I would be passing on piki making skills to my daughter and grandchildren. I am impacting the next couple of generations to learn piki making. With this I hope my daughter and grandchildren will continue to keep learning and teaching others just as I have done. With us Hopi/Tewa losing so much of our cultural and language we must take the proper steps to ensure we pass on our knowledge before it is gone.

I am confident I will be able to cover the remaining costs of this project. I work full time and my husband is self-employed. Sometimes you need a little help to get started and I feel this grant will give us that push we need. Once this project gets going I know it will motivate us to get it completed as I have always wanted my own piki house. I plan to have this project completed by July 2024.

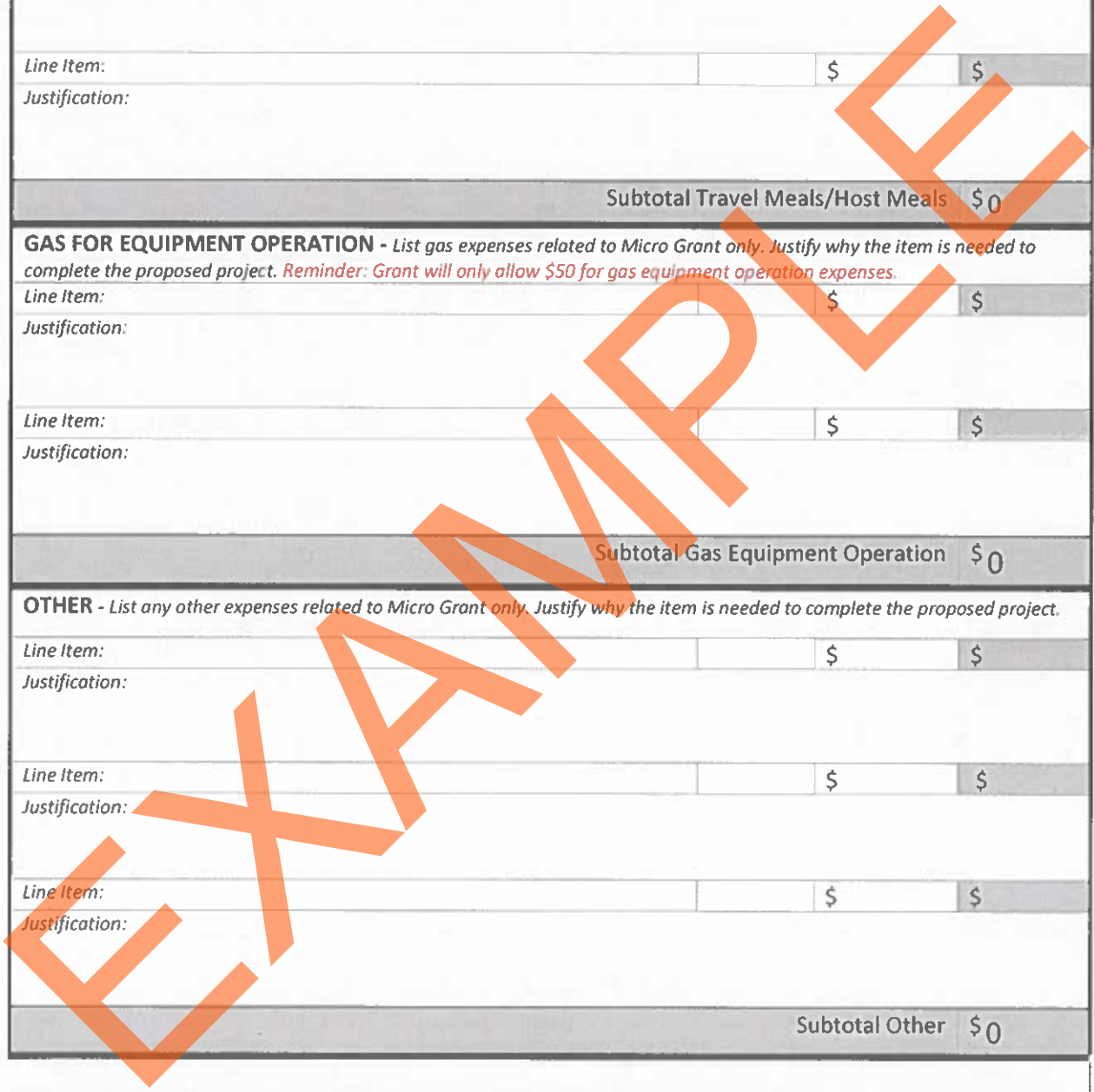

My name is [REDACTED] from the village of Sipaulovi and of the paatangwungwa (pumpkin clan). My late wife [REDACTED] is tapwungwa/pipwungwa (rabbit/tobacco clan) of Orayvi. I currently reside with my daughter and grandchildren in Orayvi. I continue to provide for my family through traditional dry farming at their family clan field south of Orayvi. The proposed project is to build a tupevqoyisi, sweet corn pit at the family corn field to continue the traditional cultural practice of roasting corn.

- 2. Project Narrative:** What is your proposed project and its purpose? Why did you choose this project?

During talapamuyaw/nasanmuyaw families come together to roast sweet corn, in a traditional underground pit. It is very rare to hear of families who have a tupevqoyisi to call their own. My children and grandchildren fall in this category of not owning or having immediate access to a tupevqoyisi to continue the cultural practice of roasting sweet corn. To support the importance of this practice the proposed project is to build a family tupevqoyisi. With family efforts this project will become a reality for our family and other families of need. Through the building process we will experience the work entailed, value the process and traditional way of preserving sweet corn in the newly built qoyisi.

- 3. How does your project incorporate Hopi values and the mission of the Natwani Coalition (to preserve and strengthen the agricultural traditions of the Hopi and Tewa people)?**

As hopi sinom we practice helping one another in the villages, with ceremonies, during naayas, field work without hesitation. Through the tupevqoyisi project family members not limited to age or gender will have a hand in building. They will have been exposed to the process and the cultural practice of tupevlawu. This contributes to culturally preserving sweet corn in a family made qoyisi.



4. Statement of Need: Describe the problem or need your project aims to address. What is the situation that is causing concern? Why is it happening?

To continue the practice of Hopi traditional ways of preserving sweet corn one must have access to a sweet corn pit to roast corn. Today, such as ours, families are challenged with not owning a qoyisi or having access to a readily available tupevqoyisi which hinders families from roasting sweet corn. Family discussions leads to the importance of building a family tupevqoyisi to utilize and it be openly available to other family members for use and maintain. Bringing this project to a reality we will then have roasted tawaktsi from our corn field or from the local corn fields off the reservation. Sweet corn to be preserved for winter months ahead, to be used during ceremonies to share and feed the people. Alongside it may be ground for toosi, qomi and resteamed or boiled. This completed project aims to address the need of a qoyisi and provides the opportunity to openly roast corn for preservation.

5. Project Impact: Identify measurable outcomes and impacts your project will have on the Hopi/Tewa Community. Provide measurable results.

The tupevqoyisi project will be 5ft x 5ft x 8ft located south of Orayvi, at the family corn field. With the support, family will work together to learn the process of building a tupevqoyisi. Family members will be exposed and have hands on learning of the building technique and would gain at least three individuals who will be fully trained on how to build a qoyisi. They will have gained the knowledge of the process of roasting corn. With a good harvest, we will roast one truck load of sweet corn to dry and store in five galvanized trash cans for the upcoming winter months. It will be used during ceremonies to feed and share with the people. With documenting, and taking digital photos we will share the process on how to build a qoyisi, creating a digital library. This will be a visual resource to share with others to continue the traditional practice of preserving tupevu.



6. Sustainability: Describes how expenses not supported by this grant will be covered and how the project effort will continue after the grant cycle ends.

Expenses not covered by the grant will be at the expense of the family bringing personal funds together or contributing supplies to complete the project. Additionally, a large bulk of project materials needed (mainly concrete bricks) will be provided through personal in-kind donations. I currently possess bricks left over from a previous project.

As the grant cycle ends, three family members (my son and two grandsons) will know how to make and maintain a qoysi. These individuals have demonstrated commitment and passion for continuing our traditional farming practices. It is through these individuals this project will continue for future generations as they will pass on the knowledge to their sons, nephews, and family/friends.
